	in the University of Southwestern Louisiana that Fall and after one
	year in pre-law, he realized that teaching was a passion that could
	really make a difference with another passion, political activism,
	and changed his major to Social Studies Education. He was the
	Outstanding Graduate of the College of Education in Fall, 1988,
	and began his teaching career as an English/Social Studies teacher
	of the gifted in 1989 in Iberia Parish. In 1993 he received his
	Master's of Education in Secondary Education with a minor in

	Gifted Education.
	After six years of teaching American literature, middle school English, African American Studies, and World Philosophy, Toby received a graduate assistantship to pursue his Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction at Louisiana State University where his concentration was curriculum theorizing. He completed his doctoral work in Fall of 1998. That semester he was appointed Assistant Professor of Teaching, Learning and Leadership at
	Western Michigan University where he worked for six years and was promoted to Associate Professor.
